




















OUR STORY

When the Turkish President declared in an infamous speech that "old Turkey no longer exists. This Turkey is new Turkey", the story of Turkish authoritarianism had once and for all taken on a new character. Since the July of 2016, the Turkish government has improperly imprisoned 130,214 homemakers, teachers, NGO workers, academics, judges, prosecutors and journalists. Once upon a time, the Republic of Turkey was lauded by insiders and outsiders for constituting a powerful model for democratization. In New Turkey, however, silence against the regime's draconian laws, mass imprisonment, and frequent violations of universal human rights has become the sole norm. In a regime which ranks as the worst upholder of the rule-of-law in Eastern Europe & Central Asia, 187 media outlets have been shut down and 308 journalists, including Idil Eser, Ahmet Altan, Hidayet Karaca, Aslı Erdoğan, Şahin Alpay, Selahattin Demirtaş, and Andrew Brunson are political prisoners of the state. Dissent in New Turkey is absent. Human rights in New Turkey are absent. Respect for human dignity in New Turkey is absent. We are a group of lawyers, judges, academics, journalists, and hundreds of activists who cherish democratic ideals and universal human rights. We are prisoners of conscience wanted by the Erdogan's regime, relatives of political prisoners, and victims who have lost their jobs, property, and family members to the current administration which has been described as a Mafia State. We are the Advocates of Silenced Turkey. We, the Advocates, have made it our mission to champion the rights of Silenced Turkey until universal human rights and democratic governance are established and sustained as the utmost priorities of the Republic of Turkey.

AST INFOGRAPHICS 2018-19 RECAP

Our infographics work began August 24, 2018. In the past year, we gathered information from comprehensive reports of human rights associations, data from several statistical institutes, and also news from many known newspapers, most notably: The Office of the United Nations High Commissioner for Human Rights, The United States Department of State, Freedom House, Amnesty International, The American Bar Association, Reuters, The Committee to Protect Journalists, Turkey Statistical Institute (TUIK), Stockholm Center for Freedom, Global Wealth Migration Review, Scholars at Risk, European Asylum Support Office (EASO), Washington Post, CBC News, POLITICO, COMMA Network, The Arrested Lawyers Initiative, Lawyer Rights Watch, World Prison Brief, Turkey Purge, Journalists and Writers Foundation, Prison Studies, Prison Insider, Ahval News.

AST created 22 pages of infographics by summarizing a total of 854 pages of information including reports, statistical databases, and news published by these organizations.

The Ministry of Justice also reported that, between July 2016 and July 2018, "investigations have been opened into **612,347** persons. The number of the people under investigation equals to the population of Vermont. A majority of these were reportedly detained for alleged ties to the *Gulen movement*, often with *little due process or access to the evidence* underlying the accusations against them.



Authorities prosecuted **1,539** lawyers, arrested **580**, and sentenced **103** to lengthy prison terms.



7,257 academics had been **dismissed** and **5,705 academics** were **suspended** since July 5th, 2016.




Human rights groups claimed **28** individuals disappeared or were the victims of politically motivated kidnapping attempts.




More than 100 members of Gulen Movement from 18 countries were taken back into Turkey forcibly by MIT, The National Intelligence Organization.





45,000 social media accounts were investigated.

Legal action had taken against **17**,000 of social media accounts on charges of propagandizing for and praising mostly Gulen Movement.

In November the Interior Ministry reported that authorities 631,233 digital materials were *investigated*, 110,000 social media publications were *monitored*, and *detained* 7,000 individuals for social media posts.



From 2014 through 2017, *government* authorities filed more than *68,000 insult*-related lawsuits against individuals or organizations.

The government blocked at least 54,400 websites during the year.

During the first six months of the year, Twitter received **8,988** court orders and other legal **requests from authorities to remove content**, more than double compared to the previous six months.



Authorities **banned seven strikes** and **suspended 15**, **affecting** nearly **200**,000 workers.



On July 25, the Ministry of Interior announced it would lift *travel bans* on **155**,000 individuals whose *family members* had alleged connections mostly with Gulen Movement.






REFUGEE PROTECTION CLAIMS FROM TURKEY TO THE IMMIGRATION AND REFUGEE BOARD OF CANADA

At least 12,000 of Turkey's millionaires — around %12 of the country's wealthy class — moved their assets out of the country in 2016 and 2017.

In October alone, 2,880Turkish citizens applied for asylum in the EU countries the application numbers in total is 17,300.

One report out of Austin, TX claims that "approximately 500 Turkish families" have come to Texas since July.



Nearly 2,000 Turkish citizens have sought asylum in Greece since the July 2016 coup attempt. In 2017, more than 14,000 Turkish citizens sought asylum in the EU -1,820 of them in Greece, making it the second-largest destination country after Germany (with 8,025).





The UN Special Rapporteur on torture, Nils Melzer, expressed serious concerns about the rising allegations of torture and other ill-treatment in Turkish police custody since the end of his official visit to the country after the coup attempt in 2016.

CHILDREN STRUGGLE IN THE PRISONS OF TURKEY

The current Penal Execution Law No. 5275 reads "Imprisonment is adjourned for women who are pregnant or who have not passed 6 months since birth"



668 children in Turkish jails

Before the state of emergency, babies younger than six months were not put in prison alongside their mothers, but now even NEWBORNS are allowed IN JAIL.

The mothers of 668 babies in jail committed no offense, they are NOT PROVEN GUILTY of the offense, and their indictments are not written.







Children have to sleep in the same bed with their mothers and are not assigned a cradle or a separate bed.

The state pays \$2 a day per prisoner for food. Since children are not technically incarcerated, they are not allotted any daily food rations and share their mother's meals.



More than %80 of children in jail with their mothers do not receive any education.


Only %18 receive kindergarten or nursery services, but even then, there is a shortage of educational materials.

VISITS 2

Children, just like jailed adults, are allowed only 4 visits a month.


NUMBER OF FEMALE PRISONERS




There were 9,985 female prisoners in October 2017, 4.4% of the prison population.

Many pregnant women or women who have recently given birth have been arrested and/or imprisoned.

In Tarsus prison in 2017, 70 women were held in a cell designed for 17.

Eventhough the current Penal Execution Law No. 5275 reads "Imprisonment is adjourned for women who are pregnant or who have not passed 6 months since birth", women are held in prison while pregnant or given birth recently.

The mothers of 668 babies in jail committed no offense, they are not proven guilty of the offense, and their indictments are not written.

The conditions for pregnant women are particularly challenging.

Prenatal care is not always adequately provided.

State of emergency on human rights in Turkey, including an update on the South-East January – December 2017

The referendum on 18 constitutional amendments, granted increased powers to the executive, as it allowed the President of the Republic of Turkey to extend his executive powers into both the legislative branch and the judiciary. It gave him the authority to enact laws bypassing the Parliament, as well as the power to control appointments and oversight procedures within the judiciary

About **60,000** security, military and police officials,

Some **33,000** teachers,

Around **6,000** academics,

Approximately **6,000** health sector personnel

alleged by the authorities to be Gülen supporters

Following the coup attempt, at least **152**,**000** civil servants were **dismissed**, and some were also **arrested**, for alleged connections with the coup, including **107**,**944** individuals named in lists attached to emergency decrees.

Approximately 600 women with young children were being held in detention in Turkey including about 100 women who were pregnant or had just given birth. Mothers and children exposed to such practices face serious risks of health complications, stunting and even death

1,719 *human rights*, humanitarian, lawyers' associations, *foundations*, NGOs, many of which were operating in the South-East were *closed*

An additional **22,474** people **lost their jobs** due to closure of private institutions, such as foundations, trade unions and media outlets

OFFICE OF THE UNITED NATIONS HIGH COMMISSIONER FOR HUMAN RIGHTS CONT

Over 4,200 judges and prosecutors were dismissed

Some **570** *lawyers* were arrested, **1,480** faced some kind of prosecution, and **79** were sentenced to *long-term imprisonment*

According to the Ministry of Interior, by the end of December 2017, 159,506 individuals had been *arrested* in relation to the emergency decrees

Approximately **300** journalists on the grounds that their publications contained apologist sentiments regarding terrorism or other "verbal act offences", or for "membership" in terrorist organizations

50,000 passports were cancelled in the aftermath of the coup attempt

Over **150**, **000** people passed through police custody **accused of terrorist offences**, **membership of armed groups**, **or involvement in the attempted coup** of July 2016

The total number of *violations* amounted to **7**,**907**, included **263** incidents of *torture* in detention, and over **100** *incidents of criminalization* of individuals for exercising their right to freedom of expression

CONCLUSION: THE PROLONGED STATE OF EMERGENCY HAS LED TO A CONTINUED EROSION OF THE RULE OF LAW AND DETERIORATION OF THE HUMAN RIGHTS SITUATION IN TURKEY.
